Alexandria Named Best U.S. Travel Destination by Money Magazine

Alexandria has been named the top U.S. destination for 2018 by Money Magazine, beating out Disneyland and other notable destinations.

Alexandria's plethora of activities and reasonable costs of airfare and hotels helped it claim the top spot. The average \$140 hotel price is about half of the downtown DC price, making it an appealing option for DC area travelers and it's not only a place to stay before heading into DC, but a place with many attractions in its own right. Some of the places mentioned are the waterfront, the shops and eateries along King Street, the Torpedo Factory Art Center and The Birchmere.

Chessie's Trail Open at Lee District Park

The Family Recreation Area at Lee District Park continues to grow in appeal to families with the addition of Chessie's Trail – a nature trail dotted with features designed to appeal to children. The 2,160-foot accessible trail winds through the wooded area below the park's treehouse and amphitheater and includes a variety of interactive features and activities including spinning rocks, nest seating, and a sound garden.

Wind Storm Knocks Over Tree George Washington Planted

A tree George Washington himself planted 227 years ago at the Mount Vernon estate was a casualty of the strong wind storm earlier this month. Washington planted the Canadian Hemlock in 1791, two years into his presidency. The Mount Vernon Estate said the tree came in half whiskey barrel from the then New York Gov. George Clinton. Washington planted the tree outside the upper garden gate.

Cherry Blossom Festival 2018

Cherry blossom season is upon us, drawing many visitors to the DC area to see the beautiful pink flowers bloom along the Tidal Basin. The 2018 National Cherry Blossom Festival will run from March 17-April 15 just as the peak bloom begins. The National Park Service predicts the peak bloom of the cherry trees will happen March 27-31.

Lee District Paving and Restriping

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has scheduled several roads in the Lee District for repaving in 2018. VDOT and FCDOT held a public meeting earlier this month on proposed paving and restriping changes and tommunity members interested in submitting comments may do so through March 23, 2018 at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/transportation/2018-paving-and-restriping/lee-district-paving-and-restriping

Please note that no additional roads can be added to the paving schedule at this time; any suggestions for new paving and restriping changes will be saved for future planning. The paving will take place starting in April and concluding in November 2018.

Stoneybrooke Storm Drain Markings

A local Eagle Scout has chosen to mark the community's storm drains as part of his Eagle Scout project.

Storm drains are located throughout the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay watersheds and what we do in our yards and communities affects the Bay through the storm drainage system. When it rains, the water running along the gutters in the street vanishes down storm drains. This runoff drains directly into a local stream. All our local streams in Fairfax County feed into the Potomac River, which empties into the Chesapeake Bay. Nothing is removed from the water. That means pet waste, yard debris, fertilizer, motor oil, pesticides and trash all have the potential to flow into our streams and the Chesapeake Bay.

Currently our storm drains are not marked. The Eagle Scout will work with the Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District and Department of Transportation to apply for and install markers.

This project is expected to be completed during the last week of March. See the flyer at the back of this newsletter for more details.

The LEDs being given away offer a warm white light that's equivalent to a 60-watt incandescent lightbulb. By replacing five old incandescents with LEDs, you could save at least \$25 a year on your electric bill. STONEYBROOKE COMMUNITY PROTECT OUR WATER: ONLY RAIN IN THE DRAIN



Storm drain markers on drains across Fairfax County tell us that anything washed or dumped down a storm drain goes directly into our streams, not to a water treatment plant. Our nearest stream, **Barnyard Run**, leads to the Potomac River, a source of drinking water and recreation.

Don't let pollutants from these sources go down the drain. Prevention is easy!

- **Sediment:** Bare soil, sand.
 - Grow native plants and use mulch on bare soil.
- **Nutrients:** Fertilizer, yard debris.
 - Limit fertilizer use, compost or bag yard debris, practice bay-friendly yard care.
- Toxics: Pesticides, motor oil, lead-based paint, salt.
 - Keep suds from car washing out of the storm drain they can be toxic to wildlife.
 - Use pesticides only when necessary and sweep up excess.
 - Dispose of motor oil, lead-based paint and pesticides as household hazardous waste. One gallon of oil can pollute two million gallons of water.
- Pathogens: Animal or human waste.
 - Scoop the poop! Keep bacteria from dog waste out of waterways.
- **Litter:** Plastic, cigarettes, styrofoam, cans.
 - Put litter in the recycling or trash.

Prevent and report storm drain dumping. If you see hazardous wastes like paint, pesticides, or motor oil dumped in storm drains, report it to Fairfax County at 703-691-2131, TTY 711.

Only Rain in the Storm Drain! Make sure that nothing other than water ever goes down your storm drain. Help keep water safe for children and future generations.
