## Virginia Hills Pool Now Accepting New Members for 2019

Located in the Virginia Hills residential community, the Virginia Hills Swim Club is currently welcoming members from communities in the local area. There are no official boundaries for the pool and there is currently no waitlist. The Virginia Hills Swim Club is also home to the Tidal Wave Swim team. The swim team is part of the Northern Virginia Swim League (NVSL). In 2018, the team was the undefeated Division 10 champions. Swim team season begins after Memorial Day and meets begin in June and run through July and is open to ages 4-18.

### New Wegmans to Be Constructed in the Eisenhower East Neighborhood

Wegmans will be building an 84,000 square-foot store in Alexandria near the Hoffman Town Center off of Eisenhower Avenue. The grocery store is part of a larger mixed-use project on the 5-acre site, according to developer StoneBridgeCarras. Much of the Wegmans will be on the second floor of the development. The project will also include at least 700 residential units. According to the project description, outdoor amenities will include pet parks, gardens, a pool with wading area, fountains, a theater and fireside lounges. With an aggressive construction timeline, the project is estimated to be completed by 2022.

Wegmans opened its Hilltop Village Center store in the Hayfield area in June 2015.

#### Planning Commission Votes to Remove Huntley Meadows Trails from Plans

The Fairfax County Planning Commission voted to support two comprehensive plan amendments that would remove a pair of planned bicycle trails at Huntley Meadows from the county's plans. The trails had been on the county's maps for years, but there had been little movement on either one, due in part to the Park Authority's opposition to them. One trail would have connected Lockheed Boulevard with Telegraph Road, while the other would have run from Hayfield Road around the southern and eastern perimeters of the park to Lockheed Boulevard. The motion will direct County staff to immediately begin identifying connectivity alternatives in advance of the Countywide Trails and Bicycle Master Plan update so that we have data and options to consider.

Many bicyclists, including the Fairfax Alliance for Better Bicycling (FABB) and State Sen. Scott Surovell, had opposed the removal of the trails from the county's maps. While sympathetic to environmental concerns raised by county staff, the cycling advocates hoped for a compromise that would allow modified trails to be built. Those trails, they argued, would ultimately be a net positive to the environment while also increasing access to the park, particularly for residents who live along its southern and eastern borders.

### Kings Crossing Development on Hold as Ownership Changes Hands

It has been more than a year since the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors gave final approval for Novus Kings Crossing, a 350-unit multifamily development to be built at the intersection of Richmond Highway and Fairview Drive. However since then the project has not moved forward, and the property is now going through an ownership change. The buyer, Fairfield Residential, intends to build on the site, according to Andrew McGeorge, a member of the company's development team. Design of that project is still being worked on with the county and any permitting and construction won't begin until the sale is completed in the summer of 2019. Right now Fairfield hopes to start actual construction sometime in the 4th quarter of 2019.

Four vacant buildings remain on the 5.3 acre property — a former Wendy's, a former Pizza Hut that had been out of business since 2014, a title loan business, and a martial arts school that was the last tenant to move. The property has had chronic issues with litter, dumping and landscaping maintenance. At least seven code complaints related to the property have been filed since July 2017, according to county records.

#### South County Government Center to be Renamed for Former Supervisor

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors voted Tuesday to rename the South County Government Center after longtime Mount Vernon District Supervisor Gerry Hyland.

Current Mount Vernon District Supervisor Dan Storck, who replaced Hyland after his retirement in 2015, put forward the measure. Storck praised Hyland's ability to communicate with constituents and called him "the epitome of a public servant." Hyland was elected as a Democrat in the fall of 1987 and served for 28 years. He had previously had a long career in the Air Force, and also served as the president of the Richmond Highway-based United Community Ministries.

Storck praised Hyland for his accomplishments on the board, including fighting the closure of Mount Vernon Hospital in the early 2000s and working to close the Lorton landfill and prison. Storck also cited Hyland's efforts to bring the South County Center to Route 1, which brought various government services closer to residents of the Richmond Highway corridor.

#### **Volunteer Program in FCPS Brings Students and Seniors Together**

GrandInvolve, a volunteer program that puts retired Fairfax County residents into Title 1 elementary schools, now works with a number of Richmond Highway-area schools and plans to keep expanding around the county. GrandInvolve, which started in 2014 at Crestwood Elementary School in Springfield, helps to improve the quality of life for older adult volunteers and school age children. The program brings older adults into Fairfax County's Title I Elementary Schools to volunteer in individual classrooms, offering their skills and talents to work directly with students. This Intergenerational and Intercultural contact allows lasting and meaningful relationships to form. The result is that folks of all ages share their talents and resources while supporting each other in relationships that benefit both the individual and the community.

The program is now in 16 elementary schools in Mount Vernon and Lee districts, which host close to half of the Title 1 schools in FCPS (schools with a high percentage of students who qualify for free and reduced lunch). The organization hopes to begin working with seven more schools in those districts in 2019.

### Work Underway on New Drive-Thru Dunkin' Donuts on Telegraph Road

Contractors have started converting an old bank building on Telegraph Road into a Dunkin' Donuts, and a spokesman for the company said they're hoping to open the location in the next month or so. The new store, located next to Hayfield Secondary School at 7710 Telegraph Road, will feature a drive-thru and have a 22-person seating capacity, according to a plan approved by the county in the fall of 2017.

The building, which was built in 1973, served as a bank for many years. It has been vacant since 2015.
