Amazon Fresh Grocery Store Opens

The Amazon Fresh grocery store in the Festival at Manchester Lakes Shopping Center in Franconia opened on Thursday, May 27.

The grocery store is opening in part of the former Shoppers grocery store, which closed in early 2020.

Amazon describes the shopping experience this way:

"Our checkout-free shopping experience is made possible by the same types of technologies used in self-driving cars: computer vision, sensor fusion, and deep learning. Just Walk Out Technology automatically detects when products are taken from or returned to the shelves and keeps track of them in a virtual cart. When you're done shopping, you can just leave the store. Later, we'll send you a receipt and charge your Amazon account. No lines, no checkout. (No, seriously.)"

Goodie's Frozen Custard & Treats Opens at The Ice House

Goodies Frozen Custard & Treats will serve carry-out frozen custard, coffee and baked goods at The Ice House building at 200 Commerce St. Goodies is known for Wisconsin-style frozen custard and treats like the donutwich (an apple cider donut stuffed with vanilla frozen custard and topped with caramel), sundaes, shakes and floats.

The Ice House was originally the property of Mutual Ice Co., Alexandria's largest ice distributor. At just 300 sq. ft. inside, the building stored ice during a time before home refrigeration was widely available. The Mutual Ice Co. was founded in 1900 on the Potomac River waterfront, selling ice to residents and servicing rail cars along the Potomac Yard rail line.

Potomac Paddle Club Takes to the Water from Old Town

Potomac Paddle Club, the first "cycleboat" in the region, will be launching from Old Town this summer.

For two Friday's each month this summer, they will be operating a two-and-a-half hour cruise that starts from The City of Alexandria Marina dock behind the Torpedo Factory and travels to National Harbor.

With a mahogany bar as its centerpiece, guests have the choice to pedal in tandem on the boat, even though it is motor-powered. Due to COVID-19, all of the Alexandria-based tours will be private groups of 10-16 passengers, perfect for birthdays, work events and celebrations. Since the pedal boat is BYOB, passengers may bring their own alcoholic beverages, with the exception of hard liquor.

Luxury Cat Hotel Wants to Open in Alexandria

JNL Bean, LLC filed a special use permit request to open a cat-exclusive hotel and grooming business at 2391 Dove St., just southeast of the Duke Street/Telegraph Road interchange.

According to the special use permit application, the operation would be "a feline-exclusive boarding facility with custom-built, individually-themed luxury spaces complete with room service, and a feline-exclusive grooming salon."


NPS Proposes 'Road Diet' on George Washington Memorial Parkway

New safety study results show speeding, certain intersections present safety problems.

This past month, the National Park Service (NPS) released a 300-page assessment of traffic and safety along the 6.3 mile stretch of the George Washington Memorial Parkway between Old Town and Mount Vernon. Chief among the recommendations in the report: Reduce traffic lanes from four to three and add a turning lane.

"We are being responsive to comments from the public and the expert advice of transportation professionals," Superintendent of George Washington Memorial Highway Charles Cuvelier said in a press release. "Whether you are a park visitor or commuter, these changes will make driving, walking and bicycling between Alexandria and Mount Vernon safer and more enjoyable for everyone."

The study focused on nine intersections along the parkway (see map below).

The report proposes a variety of short term and long term solutions. Initial improvements, which could begin later this year, include the following:

Restripe the road to implement a road diet while maintaining driving capacity.

On the parkway between Tulane Drive and Stratford Lane, the NPS will change markings so that there will be three travel lanes (2 northbound, 1 southbound) and one turn lane.

Increase visibility of lane markings and Mount Vernon Trail crosswalks.

Remove vegetation at intersections to improve visibility.

Other efforts and projects could include more public education, increased policing and enforcement of speed limits and distracted driving. Officials are also considering the addition of rumble strips, improvements to traffic patterns (like pedestrian and bicycle refuge islands, roundabouts and U-turn and left-turn lanes) and additional lighting, striping and signs.
