Letter from the Board

Hollin Hills Home & Garden Tour

Saturday, May 2nd, 12pm - 6pm

The neighborhood of modern homes is located five miles south of Old Town Alexandria.

The 326-acre neighborhood was built from the late 1940s to the early 1970s by developer Robert Davenport and architect Charles Goodman. Hollin Hills was the first community in the DC metro area to be made up entirely of contemporary homes. Recognized for its architectural and design vision, Hollin Hills was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2013, and is a Virginia Landmark Historic District.

The self-guided walking tour, scheduled rain or shine, will showcase examples of mid-century modern architecture, landscaping and interior design.

VCA Animal Hospital to End Overnight Emergency Services in Alexandria

Effective Feb. 24, VCA Animal Hospital on Duke Street will be closing its 24-hour pet emergency service. In a letter to clients, VCA management cited the difficulty in being able to hire and retail veterinarians who are willing to work overnight hours.

This isn't a local issue: The American Veterinary Medical Association reported the nationwide shortage of veterinarians can be attributed, in part, to the very high cost of veterinary school and the emotional toll of veterinary work. The Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care Society and American College of Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care have launched a task force to study the shortage of emergency and critical care veterinarians in particular.

Revel Wine Bar Opens in Belle View Shopping Center

Revel wine and craft beer bar is officially open for business in the Belle View Shopping Center.

The location held its soft opening in mid-January and has the same owners as Unwined next door.

With a wine menu boasting more than 150 different bottles ranging in price from \$32-\$650, Revel has something for everyone and every occasion.

Food at Revel focuses around plates to be shared. There is the expected cheese and charcuterie board, which include options from both Virginia and Maryland farms, and gets jazzed up with accompaniments such as pickled watermelon and caramelized onions.

Lidl To Open New Springfield Store

Discount grocery store chain Lidl is set to open a location in Springfield on Wednesday, Feb. 19. It will be located at 6801 Commerce Street.

The store will open with a ribbon cutting at 7:40 a.m. and a weekend of special offers, giveaways and prizes. The first 100 customers will receive a gift card with a value between \$5 and \$100. Free samples and complimentary Lidl reusable bags will be available while supplies last.

Jimmy John's in Kings Crossing Closes

The Jimmy John's in the King's Crossing Shopping Center has closed.

Located in the shops across from Walmart at 6305 Richmond Highway, Jimmy John's closed permanently because the franchisee decided to cease operations there, according to a Jimmy John's spokesman. The location opened in late 2012, shortly after the shopping center was completed.

A representative from Rosenthal did not immediately respond to an email asking about possible future tenants for the Jimmy John's space.

Jimmy John's opened a new location at the other end of Richmond Highway in the ground-level retail of the Belvoir Square apartments in 2019. There are also nearby locations in Kingstowne and the City of Alexandria.

Speed Camera Legislation in the Works in Virginia

Speed cameras in the District and Maryland have produced millions in revenue and proponents argue they have made roads safer. They could become legal in Virginia.

Earlier this year, Gov. Ralph Northam, along with Virginia House Democrats, proposed a series of driving safety measures. Those measures include allowing local governments to lower speed limits in business or residential districts to less than 25 mph, and permitting stationary speed cameras on certain interstates and primary roads designated as safety corridors.

Since speed cameras are not legal in Virginia, Alexandria uses speed awareness cameras, which do not issue fines, throughout the city. Reports from the U.S. Dept. of Transportation (USDOT) show these signs are effective in reducing traffic speeds and increasing speed limit compliance, but they only work for a limited time before drivers start to ignore them.

Alexandria has, in recent years, reduced speed limits on some major roadways, including Seminary Road and Richmond Highway, to the lowest allowed speed of 25 mph.

If the Commonwealth gives the green light to speed cameras, Alexandria and Fairfax County will be then given the option to deploy them.
